We are holding these online every few weeks with on average 6 local groups attending. It is a great way to learn from others around the county. These sessions have proved so useful and worthwhile for networking and sharing ideas.

Volunteer Information Sessions on Zoom: These are regular, informal sessions on Zoom where you can meet Olivia and Riona, our Volunteer Development Officers. Aimed at potential volunteers, these informal sessions will cover any questions you may have about what volunteering options are available, how to apply, Garda Vetting etc. There will be time for questions about your particular interests or to arrange a 1:1 follow up call- next one is Tuesday 24th August at 2pm.

Q & A Session- Taking the fear out of GDPR: We will be hosting a FREE Q and A session at the end of September for anyone who has any small or big questions regarding GDPR. We will post a link to the event on our Social Media pages (Twitter, Instagram and Facebook) when we finalise the date.

Garda Vetting Training: New legislation brought in May 2016 has brought about significant changes to the vetting system, with further amendments since that date. Sligo Volunteer Centre process vetting on behalf of a number of affiliates. If your organisation would like to avail of the Garda Vetting service, or just find out more, this is the training for you. Training will be given online via Zoom under the current circumstances.

Cost: €25 (further €25 to register with the GV service after training) This training is suitable for not for profit organisations who wish to sign up to our E-Vetting service. Ideally the attendee will be the person who is going to be administering the vetting in their organisation. It is also suitable for Board Members.

The wildflower garden started by one of our residents Kevin is alive with bees, butterflies and moths – the whole area is alight with colour and thrumming with insects.

Our new outdoor seating (partly funded with grants from the PPN) arrived during the pandemic. It is planned to surround the seating areas with more wildflower gardens, following the wonderful display that can be seen in Kevin's garden.

About 35% of the world's food crops need insects to pollinate them. The loss of pollinating insects could threaten our own food supply.

With the decline in natural habitats, pollinators such as bees, butterflies and moths are also on the decline, so planting wildflowers benefits the whole ecosystem.

Everyone can do their bit to help by planting some wildflowers in their garden, or reducing the use of weedkillers, or even just cutting the grass a little less often.

The residents of the Village are, through the medium of a Time Capsule, planning to store for posterity, a selection of items representative of life at this particular time, and in particular the last year and a half.

We are also planning to plant an Oak tree in the grounds of the Village following the theme "Restoring Our Common Home through Tree Planting" - Season of Creation 2021.

An outdoor Mass is also planned at a time when it is safe to do so. All Government rules will be adhered to.









The community garden is open to all on Mondays between 11am and 1pm and Tuesdays between

MSLETB have allocated a staff member to help with all levels of Computer use and ability. So even if you have never <u>opened up</u> a laptop we have help at hand. 

The Bard of Kilmactigue

The Henry <u>L.Gavigan</u> Commemorative Group are about to publish a new book, Henry L. Gavigan - His Life and Collected Poems. This project has been part funded by Sligo County Council through a Community Heritage Project grant. The book has been researched by Pat McCarrick.


Henry Lawrence Gavigan (1872-1933), lived a life that encountered great contrast. He was one of eleven children born into poverty, to parents who had survived the Great Famine. He grew up in an Ireland that was conflicted between its loyalty to the British Empire on one hand and a desperate struggle to escape it on the other.

After attending and teaching school in his native Kilmactigue in Co. Sligo, Henry emigrated to America in 1893. He quickly made his way in life, progressing to Head of Department in the largest Post Office facility in the US Postal Service. During his lifetime, Henry developed a reputation as a poet and became affectionately known as, *The Bard of Kilmactigue*.

Many of his poems were inspired by his native place, his deep affection for his mother and Irish Nationalism. Henry Lawrence Gavigan, the Bard of Kilmactigue, the Claddagh Poet, accomplished violinist, writer and antiquarian, died in New York in March 1933. He is buried beside his brothers, Anthony and Joseph in Calvary Cemetery in Queens.

> Far away in Old Ireland, there's one home for me, A home I will think of, where e're I may be Where the shamrocks are blooming, so fresh and so fair, N'eath the green shady mountains that shadow Aclare.

September sees the big return to school and this year we hope it will be smooth, happy and uninterrupted for the school community. #GetToSchoolOnyourOwn Fuel is a <u>women</u> led initiative of the Cyclist.ie Rural Collective and Sligo Cycling Campaign is encouraging pupils and parents to consider cycling to school and help them find and practice safe routes to school.

For the past year the cycling campaign has supported the Strandhill Cycle Bus. We will continue to do this but would be delighted to help to set up another cycle bus in Sligo town or the surrounding area. We would also be happy to accompany any parent on a cycle to suss out a route to their school.

This year there will be extra encouragement and support to get to school on your own fuel by walking, cycling, scooting or skating. The Government has announced a Safe Routes to School programme and along with Strandhill, two Sligo town schools, Scoil Ursula and St John's are set to benefit in the 2021-2022 school year. The programme will be coordinated by Green Schools Ireland and works will be carried out by Sligo County Council with the advice of the National Transport Authority. Jesus and Mary secondary school in Enniscrone will also receive funding for Safe routes to School.

As we well know covid 19 had a massive impact on all of us, but the impact on our youth was enormous. At such a vulnerable age, <u>12 to 18 year</u> old's missed out on so much throughout last year with schools being closed and the option to connect with friends and family taken away.

Foróige along with a small number of volunteers and the volunteer led Sligo Foróige District Council continued to organise online meetups and programs which were a big help, but not the same as young people meeting other young people in person. So, the District Council with the support of some of the Sligo/Leitrim clubs set up a kayaking summer program. The clubs used their yearly grant money to put towards the purchasing of Kayaking boats and equipment, and the District Council gathered what money they could so that collectively we could offer the young people in Sligo and Leitrim a summer of fun on the water. It was initially to be 3 days a week for 6 weeks but with so many young people wanting to do it the program we ended up running for 7 weeks with 4 to 5 full days.

Alan Judge the Regional Youth Officer for Sligo/Leitrim at the time and a very experienced Kayaking instructor supported us in purchasing the equipment, along with the setting up and running of the programme. Teresa Conway, a Leader with Tubbercurry Foróige Club very generously gave many hours of her time as a volunteer supporting Alan on the water. This kayaking club gave young people the opportunity to get outside, connect with other young people, learn something new, have the craic and banter, and just be outside living life in a healthy way. Sligo Foróige District Council would like to thank Alan and Teresa for their dedication, commitment and the positive impact they have had on the young people's lives.

We are currently looking to source further kayaking instructors to allow us to continue to run this program again next summer. If you know someone who may be interested please contact brendanlynch79@yahoo.ie

Coffee Mornings:



Take the Challenge, join the Experience, Ditch the duvet and pack away the pillows all for a good cause.








Volunteering opportunity




