Nature teaches us many stories about equality. We are now going to learn from some of these interesting stories, and explore what equality means in our lives.

Lessons from bees, seahorses and penguins


In nature caring and nurturing roles are shared between males and females.

The worker bee is female and has many roles. These include taking care of the hive, nursing the queen bee and drone bees, building the hive, guarding the hive, and foraging for pollen, nectar and water.


Seahorses are fascinating little fish found worldwide in tropical and temperate coastal waters. The male seahorse is unique; it is they only male in the entire animal kingdom that experiences pregnancy. It has a tiny pouch on its stomach in which to carry babies.

Penguins are found in the Southern Hemisphere. They have busy days collecting food, creating nests and shelter, and protecting chicks and eggs. This work is shared equally between the pair of penguins.

1. Nurturing means to care for something.




Experiment - What is Equality?

- Poster card











3. Draw or write what equality means to you on each of your hexagons.



1. Draw some hexagonal shapes on the coloured card. (try to make them roughly the same size)




2. Cut the hexagons out of the card using a scissors.

Did you learn something new about equality from your classmates? Did your classmates have different ideas that you thought were interesting?


Sometimes we think that treating everyone equally means treating everyone the same. Let's explore this a little bit further.

Imagine that there are five children in your class that wear glasses. The class must complete a lesson by reading what the teacher has written on the board. Everyone who completes the lesson wins a prize. The teacher makes the five children take off their glasses so that everyone in the class is treated the same. The five children in the class will not be able to read the lesson and will not have the same opportunity to win a prize as everyone else. Is this fair? Is everyone treated equally?

Equality is not achieved by treating everyone the same. It is achieved by treating everyone fairly and putting in place the supports that individuals need to reach their full potential.




What Can We Do?


Encourage your friends to pursue their interests regardless of gender norms.
